






Nicholas Morvay is a musician from Windsor, Ontario. He graduated from the University of Windsor with degrees in music and education and did his Masters studies at the University of Saskatchewan where he studied music composition. He is currently the Musical Director at Emmanuel United Church and as well as Music Director and Orchestra Conductor at Windsor Light Music Theatre. He also directs and sings with the a cappella group Masquerade and plays piano and celeste with the WSO.



PAUL R WHARRAM is a distinguished choral conductor and musician who served as the Artistic Director of the County Classic Chorale from 2010 to 2023, when he became the Chorale's Director Emeritus. He was born and raised in Leamington, where he studied piano with his mother, Gladys Wharram, ARCT, and organ with Allanson Brown. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts in French and Music Education from the University of Western Ontario. He taught Music ad French in Kent County and Windsor for a number of years before joining the Red Cross movement. He had a long and successful career with both the National and International Red Cross, working in Toronto, Africa, Geneva and Ottawa. He is currently the President of the Windsor Essex Centre of the Royal Canadian College of Organists, a national organization that promotes excellence in organ playing and choral conducting, and the Minister of Music and Organist at The Church of the Epiphany in Kingsville. He has led many choral workshops, and worked with children's and youth choirs such as the Windsor Essex Youth Choir and Music Moves Kids.



Kimberley Myers' career began with an emphasis on Czech and Russian roles, having gained the attention of Sir Charles Mackerras in the roles of *Jenufa* and *Kát'a Kabanová*. She has always been a supporter and promoter of new music having been involved with 6 world premieres including being conducted by James Macmillan at Welsh National Opera in the world premiere run of his opera, The Sacrifice, in the lead role of Sian. In the past few seasons, in addition to several Verdi Requiems, she has moved into the Wagnerian Repertoire and has performed all 3 *Brünnhildes* and *Isolde* with orchestras and onstage.

Kimberley graduated from The Royal Academy of Music with the Dip RAM. Prizes include the Russian Song Prize, the Anglo-Czechoslovak Trust Vocal Competition, and The Emmy Destinn award in addition to many awards as a student at the RAM. She was awarded the second highest recital result in her graduating year at The Royal Academy of Music. She was a finalist in the Bayreuth Bursary, the inaugural Ralph Wells Award and The Queen Sonja International Singing Competition.



Ron Kischuk is entering his seventh season as Artistic Director of the Toledo Jazz Festival. In this capacity he has developed all the performance programming for the organization. Ron is also the Director of the festival's educational programs and community outreach. He is the leader of The Masters of Music Big Band, The Tartarsauce Traditional Jazz Band, and is the owner of Brassworks Entertainment in Detroit and The Masters Of Music Conservatory in Royal Oak.

Ron was the artistic director of the Toledo Jazz Orchestra for 10 years, the longest tenure ever for that organization. He developed all programming and educational programs for the jazz orchestra and directed same.

Ron is on the adjunct faculty of Wayne State University teaching classical and jazz trombone, marketing and artist management, and the history of rock and roll. Ron is a Yamaha clinician and performing artist and is the one of the country's most prominent trombonists. He has been a featured soloist with The Detroit Symphony Orchestra on numerous occasions and has performed extensively with the orchestra as principal or assistant principal trombonist. Ron is presently the principal trombonist of the Rochester Symphony Orchestra.



Brent Ghiglione was raised in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, Brent Ghiglione started his musical career with the Moose Jaw Lions Jr. Band. He continued his musical education at the University of Regina where he graduated with a B.Mus. Ed. degree. He also completed a Diploma of Fine Arts from the University of Calgary in Wind Band Conducting and Repertoire and finished his Masters of Education from the University of Victoria.

After teaching at Campbell Collegiate for 17 years Brent moved to the University of Regina where he is director of bands responsible for the Wind Ensemble and Concert Band. Mr. 'G' as he is affectionately known, is recognized for setting high expectations for his students. As a trumpet player, he is a member of the Regina Symphony Orchestra and currently leads The Bob Moyer Big Band and the Regina Jazz Orchestra (RJO). Brent started the Regina Jazz Orchestra (RJO) a professional big band and the Regina Winds a semi professional wind band.

Brent is also an active clinician and adjudicator and is a Yamaha Performing Artist.



David Lum retired from public school teaching in February of 2021, following a 32-year career in with the former Scarborough Board of Education and the Toronto District School Board. He is a founding member of the Ontario Band Association and served on the board of the Ontario Music Educators' Association from 2000-2015 and is an Honorary Life Member of both the OBA and the OMEA. David is a recipient of the Keith Mann Outstanding Band Director Award, presented by MusicFest Canada and is a Laureate of the Legion of Honor for the John Philip Sousa Society. He is the President of the Lambda lota chapter of the Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters' Fraternity. Currently, David teaches the Music Qualification course for the Faculty of Education and is the instructor of the Tuba/Euphonium studio in the Faculty of Arts, Media, Design, and Performance at York University. David is a Conn-Selmer Educational Clinician.

Vincent Chandler is a trombonist, educator, composer, scat singer, band leader and conductor from Detroit, MI. He has shared the stage with Detroit jazz all-stars, such as Kenn Cox, Donald Walden, Harold McKinney, Wendell Harrison, Marcus Belgrave, Rodney Whitaker, Regina Carter, Marion Hayden, Robert Hurst and James Carter. Vincent has performed nationally with Joe Henderson, Stefon Harris, Geri Allen, Jeff "Tain" Watts, Ravi Coltrane, JD Allen, The Oliver Lake Big Band and The Ambrose Akinmusire Big Band. He performed internationally with J@LC with Wynton Marsalis and The Roy Hargrove Big Band. He was a featured artist on the 2009 Playboy Jazz Festival, where he performed with Marcus Miller, Herbie Hancock, Keb' Mo and the Roy Hargrove Quintet. He was a featured soloist on Roy Hargrove's only Big Band CD, called "Emergence." He is currently an Assistant Professor of Jazz Studies at Wayne State University, Conductor of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra - Civic Jazz Orchestra, Detroit Symphony Orchestra Paradise Jazz Series Big Band bandmember and a 2020 Kresge Artist Fellow.





John Phillips – In demand as an adjudicator and clinician, John Phillips shares his unique brand of music education through workshops with State and Provincial Music Educators' Associations, the National Association for Music Education, and as a presenter at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. Throughout his career, he has contributed to numerous initiatives with Music for All including the National Concert Festival, the annual Summer Symposium, and the Bands of America Grand Nationals. He is a Conn-Selmer Educational Clinician and on faculty at the Conn-Selmer Institute. Phillips recently retired from Florida Gulf Coast University.

He regularly guest conducts honour bands across Canada and the United States. For twenty years he conducted the Wind Ensemble at the National Music Camp of Canada and has been a guest conductor at the International Music Camp. Phillips has served as Judge Administrator for Drum Corps International since 2000, and was inducted into the DCI Hall of Fame, Class of 2015. Phillips is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario where he received undergraduate degrees in Music and Education. He pursued a Masters Degree in Music Education at Boston University, a PhD in Ethnomusicology at York University, and holds an Artist Diploma in trumpet performance from the Western Conservatory of Music.





Richard Baker: Born in Montreal Canada, Richard started studying music at age three, and gave his first concert at age five. His private studies on the piano and music theory led him to McGill University faculty of music, where he studied Composition and Conducting. Richard has scored over 30 films as well as TV and Advertising. His clients include USA Network, Syfy, Miramax Films, Lion's Gate, NBC, Kraft Foods, Hyatt Hotels, The Discovery Channel, and Fox Reality TV. A multi-Gold and Platinum record holder, his work appears on over 100 albums as Musician, Composer, Arranger, Programmer and Producer, with artists The Santana Band, Uncle Kracker, Saga, Glenn Hughes, Yes, Gary Wright, Gino Vannelli, Beth Hart and many more. He worked for many years as a session player in Los Angeles, and performed on TV scores, Records, Radio and Advertising, as well as multiple world tours and television appearances. He recently sat on the Board of The Screen Composers Guild of Canada.
